CASE FOR DISCUSSION



Seneca reported to the police that his Corvette, which had been parked on a street, had disappeared. A few weeks later a police officer observed a car with an expired inspection sticker, and when the driver stopped, the officer asked the driver for his driver's license and owner's card. The driver could produce neither. A serial number check was then made, and it was found that the car had been stolen. The driver was charged with receiving stolen property and unauthorized use of an automobile. (*Commonwealth of Pennsylvania v*.

- (1) Does this case come under civil or criminal law?
- (2) Why wasn't the person in the car charged with "Grand Larceny?"
- (3) What do you think should happen to the person in the car?
- (4) What do you think did happen to the person in the car?
- (5) What legal rights were invaded which resulted in this case?
- (6) If you were Seneca, what would you want to happen?
- (7) How could Seneca protect himself against the having his car stolen?
- (8) What sanction (penalty) would deter the illegal conduct we see in this case?
- (9) Who pays for the type of illegal conduct we see in this case?
- (10) How do we know the illegal conduct here is wrong?

(11) Where does the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania get the right to impose legal sanctions on Belcher, if it does have that right?
